# DESIGN YOUR OWN GREEK POTTERY



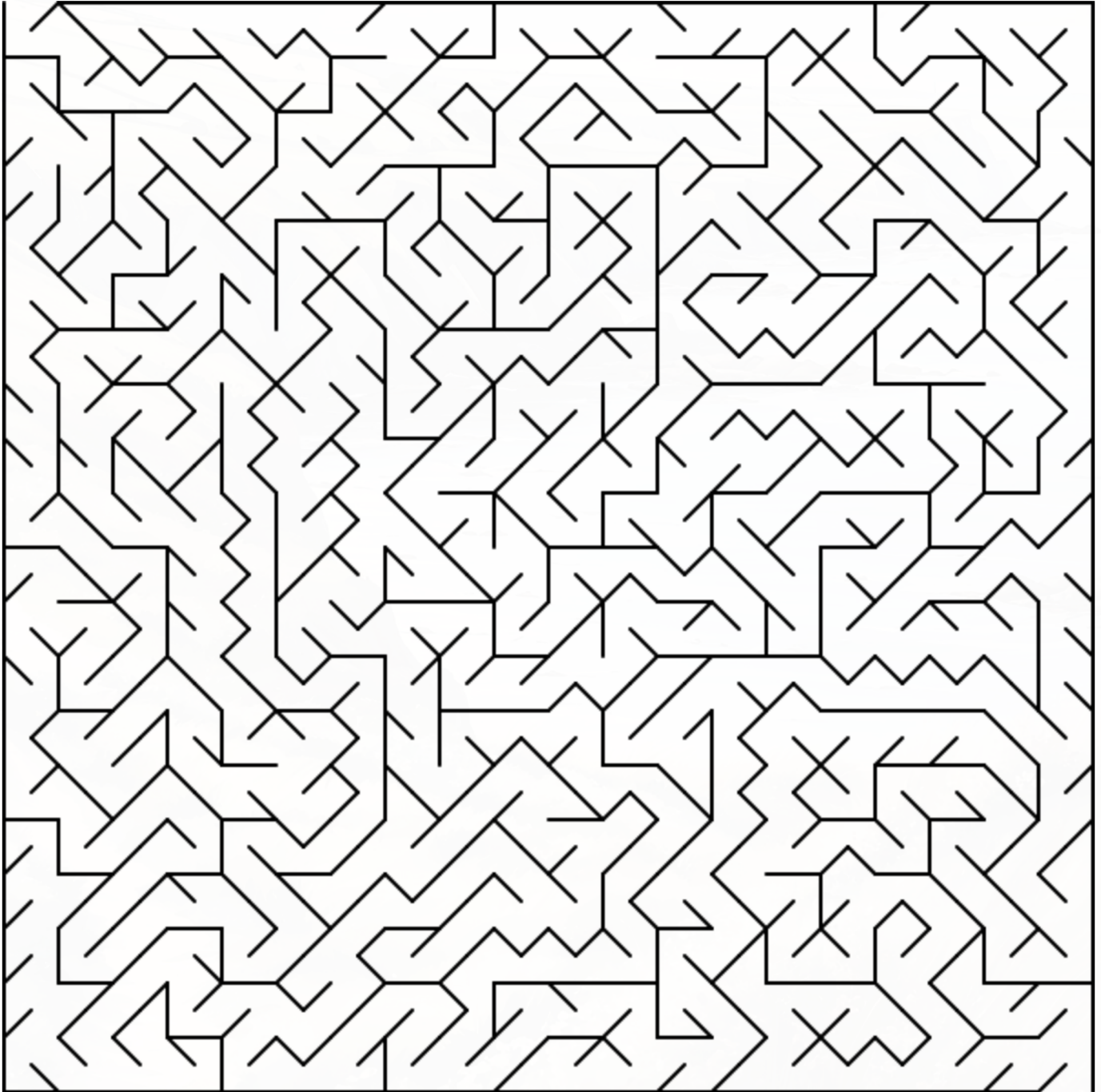
Ancient Greek pottery was like a story in clay. Artists painted heroes, gods, sports, and daily life on jars and bowls. Each pot teaches history without words!

## Get Curious! Research and Discover



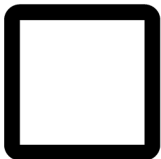
### Marathon Math

→ Trace the route from Marathon to Athens (~42 km). Convert kilometers to miles, estimate a beginner's running pace, and calculate finish time. Reflect: Why is this distance meaningful today?



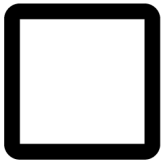
### Island Hoppers

→ Choose three Greek islands (e.g., Naxos, Paros, Santorini). Sketch a simple ferry map, estimate travel times between them, and make a one-day mini-itinerary.



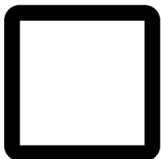
### Quakes, Fire, & Islands

→ Explore Santorini's caldera on a map. Sketch the island ring, mark the volcano, and explain (in 3–4 sentences) how volcanoes/earthquakes helped shape Greece. Add one safety tip for living in a quake zone.



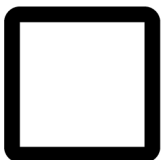
### Olympic Hero Profile
