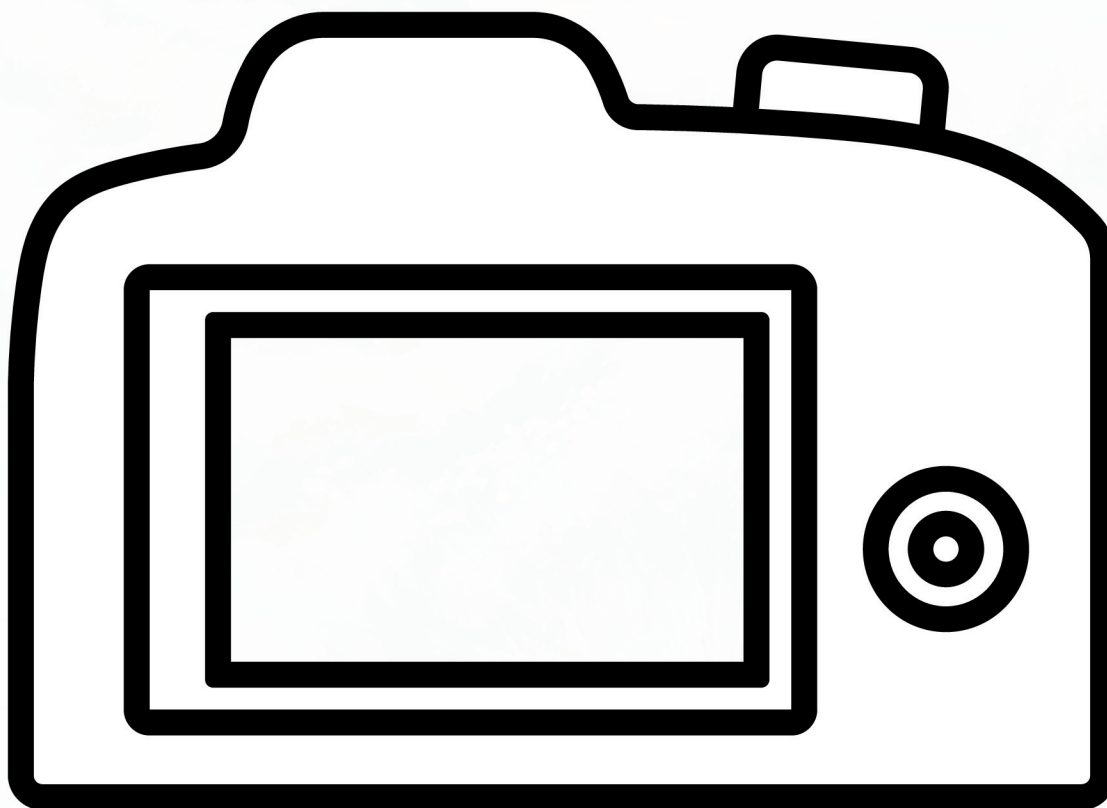

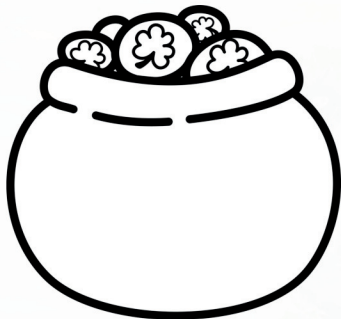




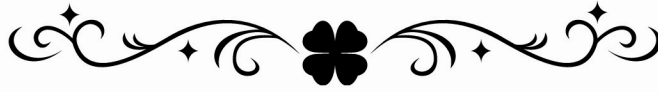
POT OF GOLD IN IRELAND



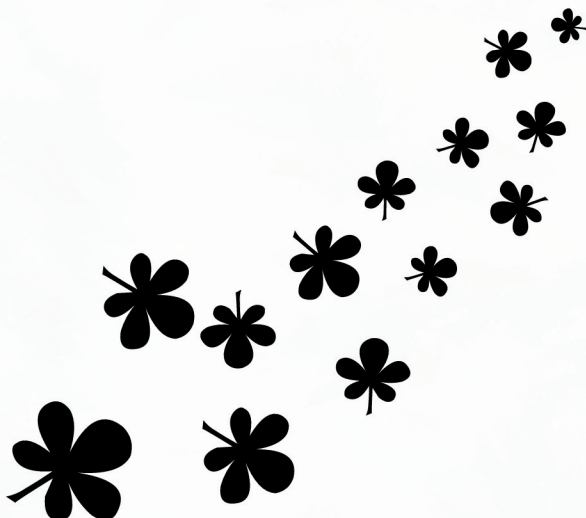

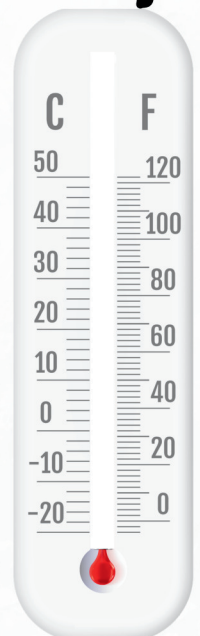
DISCOVER IRELAND

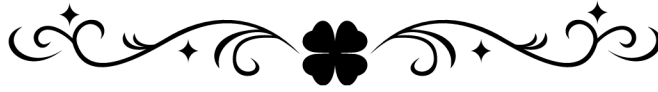

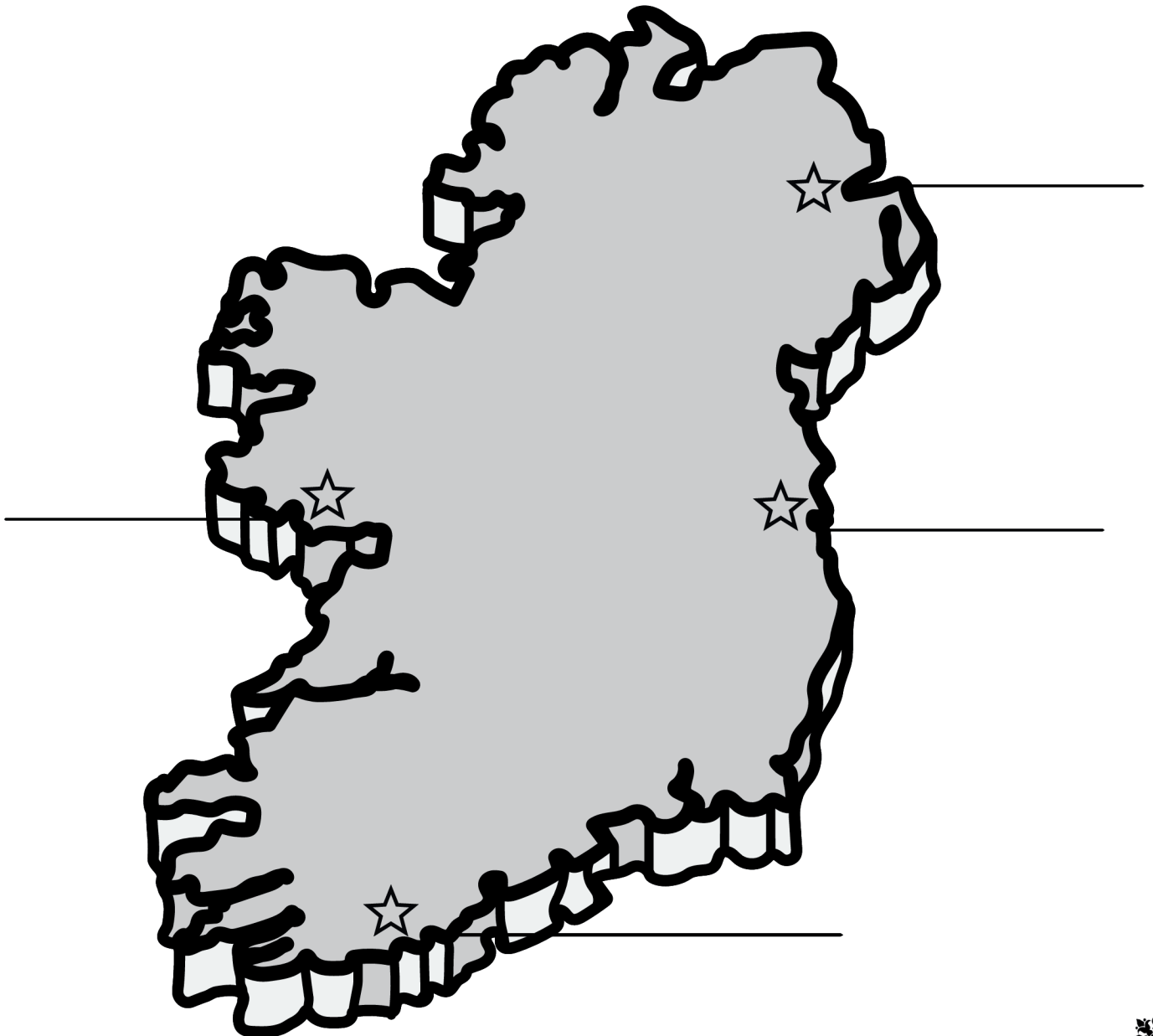

MAP OF IRELAND

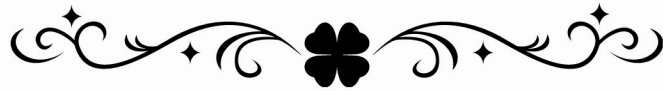


Match each city to its correct location on the map. Then add any other landmarks you'd like to include!

- Cork is a major southern city, nicknamed the "Rebel City," with a busy harbor and markets.



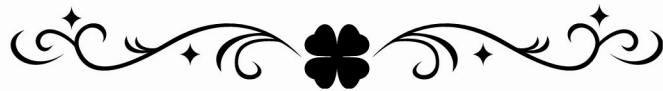
DESIGN YOUR OWN CASTLE

CELTIC KNOTS

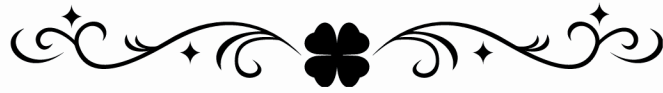


Symmetry is when one side mirrors the other. Finish the other half of these Celtic knots to make them symmetrical!

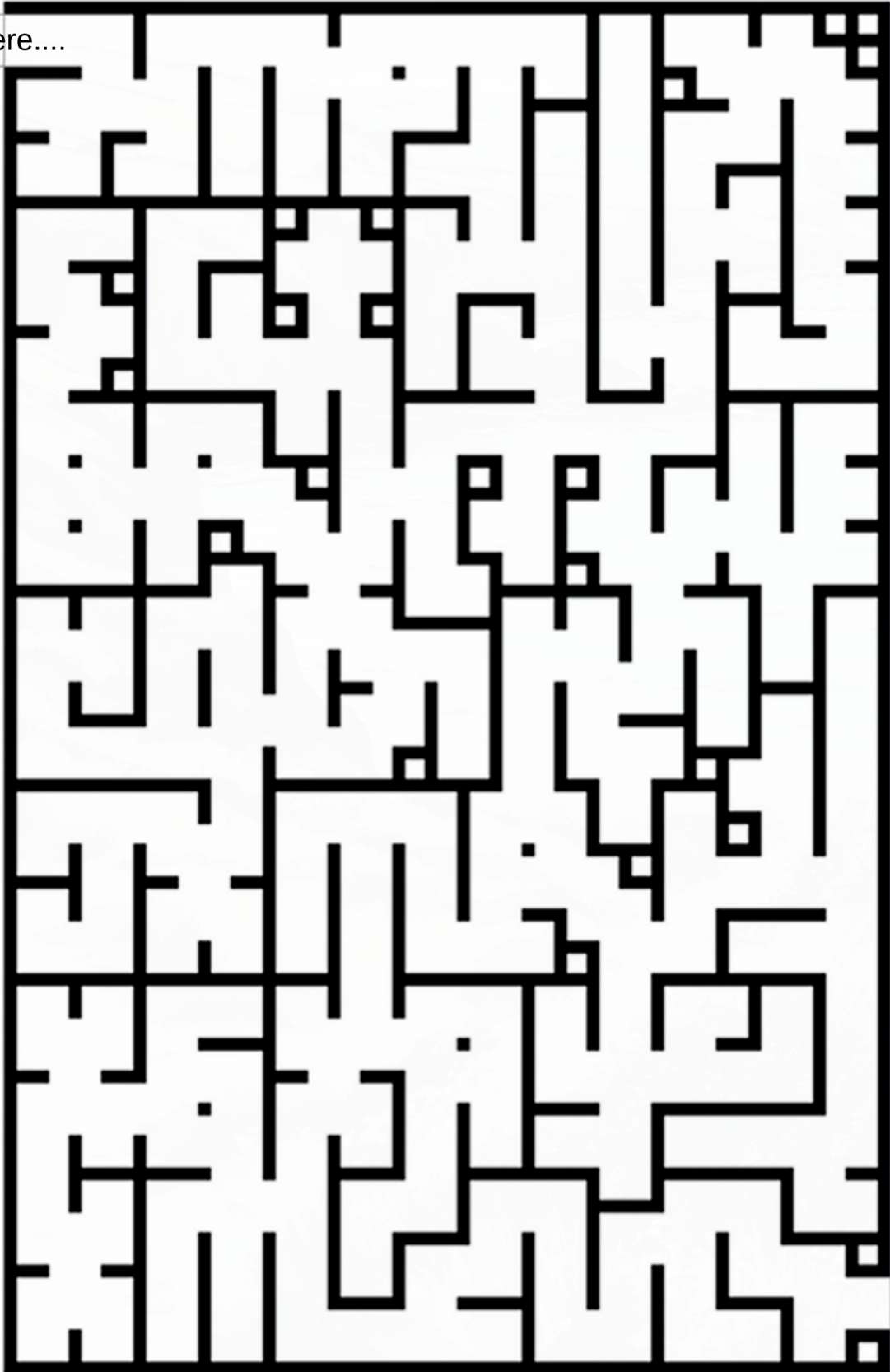

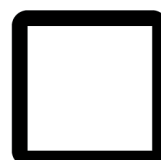
Cliffs of Moher Science: Layers, Time, and Tiny Changes

The Cliffs of Moher look like one giant wall—but they are built from layers of rock laid down over time. Look up what kind of rock makes up the cliffs (and what those layers were made from long ago). Now do the deeper part: explain how small forces—wind, waves, rain—can reshape something massive. Connect it to character: What “small habits” shape a person over time the same way? Write about it in your journal.



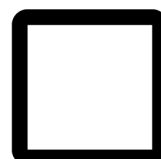
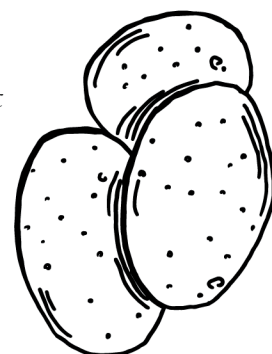
Irish Harp Physics: Sound, Vibration, and Emotion

The harp is a national symbol of Ireland—and its sound is made by vibrating strings. Look up how string length, thickness, and tension affect pitch. Then do a mini experiment: stretch a rubber band over a box and pluck it. Change the tension. What happens? Now journal: Why do certain sounds feel peaceful or sacred? What role does music play in worship and memory?



Prepared for Hard Times- Understanding the Irish Potato Famine

The Great Famine in Ireland reminds us how quickly life can change when food becomes scarce. Read a few quotes from Latter-day Saint prophets about preparedness and storing food, then make a simple plan for your family: What foods would store well, how much would you need for one week, where would you keep it, and could you grow or produce any food yourself? As you plan, think deeper—why do prophets encourage preparedness? Is it about fear, or about faith and peace? Write a few sentences about how being prepared can bless your family and help you serve others in hard times.



A Little Limerick Fun

A limerick is a five-line poem with a playful rhythm and a rhyme pattern of AABBA. Lines one, two, and five rhyme with each other, while lines three and four are shorter and share a different rhyme. Write your own limerick about Ireland—perhaps about a castle, a sheep, St. Patrick, the rain, or even a leprechaun. Be creative, have fun with the rhythm, and see if you can make it clever or surprising!
